# Subject History

#### Introduction:

Welcome to the History area.

History has always been a subject which encourages students to question what they are being told and asks them to build an argument, with supporting evidence, to show why they believe their answer is a true reflection of what occurred in the past. History is a subject respected for its skills, not just its content. Students learn to understand their wider environment and how we have progressed to the point we are now at.

For Key Stage 3 students are required to build their knowledge from Medieval through to 20<sup>th</sup> Century Britain, applying this knowledge through the skills they learn and develop throughout the first three years. Many students choose to continue History into GCSE as the new GCSE course offers exciting challenges using America 1920-1973 as the first unit, which explores everything from domestic politics encouraging the Boom to the Ku Klux Klan, again developing the skills they have obtained in Key Stage 3.

We have also seen an increase in numbers for A level History in the last few years as History is very well respected by universities and employers alike, due to the level of skill and difficulty it involves. Many students have returned to Yateley and explained how their Historical investigation was the work that has enabled them to understand and fulfil what is expected of them from their university degree courses.

#### **Assessment:**

### KS3

- Regular homework and knowledge tests
- Half termly assessments with focused feedback to support progression
- Regular verbal feedback regarding group work and presentations

#### KS4

- Individual, small group and whole class exam skills and questions weekly
- Homework based on lesson content and exam skills fortnightly
- Regular verbal feedback in lessons.
- Mock exams in December
- Revision leading up to the exam in June includes further exam practise.

## KS5

- From both sides of the course there are essays on a fortnightly basis, alternating between exam board statement validity questions and historical interpretation questions.
- Historical investigation which is 20% of the students' final grade.
- Mock exams in January
- Revision leading up to the exam in June includes further exam practise.
