






Kwame's advice on making university standard notes

I'm currently studying Human Rights Law at LSE and I've learnt how to take notes in a way that helps me learn a huge amount of information easily! Below is a demonstration of how I always make my notes look, using 'Lord of the Flies' as an example.



4. A picture paints a thousand words

As colour-coding shows, **visual notes** are easier to remember. Everyone's brain is different, but in general we tend to be better at remembering pictures and images than words and numbers. Pairing some of your bullet points with a related image is an effective way of reinforcing the association because you've given yourself a visual stimulus as well as a verbal one.

1. Draw a line

Before you write your notes, the first thing to do is **draw a dotted line** down the middle of the page. This is the maximum length your bullet point can be, so you have to make them short and punchy!

2. Don't overdo it

Reduce the amount of information on a page. Condense a sentence into five or six key **trigger words** which will be easier to remember. And because trigger words are the most crucial information, you know that what you're learning will get you marks in an exam.

3. Keep it colourful

Using colour in our notes can be a powerful tool to help us memorise. But don't just cover your notes randomly with highlighters! Use a **colour-coding system** to help you. For example, you might write all your **key dates** in **red** for History, or all of the **key terms** in your plant biology module in **green**. This will help create a visual association in your brain, making recalling the information easier.





NOTES TO PARENTS/CARERS

The law does not grant parents/carers an automatic right to take their children out of school during the term time. If the request is for absence in term time you must have Parental Responsibility and be the parent/carer with whom the child normally lives. Permission must be sought in advance. If the circumstances relating to this request are considered exceptional and the absence is authorised by the school, the authorising of the absence will be conditional based on the child(ren)'s satisfactory attendance up to the date covered by the request.

WARNING: If the school refuses your request and the child is still taken out of the school, this will be recorded as an unauthorised absence. A significant amount of unauthorised absence may make you liable to a Penalty Notice for each child, payable by each parent/carer, or the subject of court proceedings which could result in a fine of up to £2,500 and/or a term of imprisonment of up to 3 months.

AVOIDABLE ABSENCE IN TERM-TIME

IMPORTANT: Please read carefully the information below.

WARNING: If you allow your child to miss school in term time for an avoidable reason without obtaining the prior approval of the school, you may be issued with a Penalty Notice per parent per child, or made the subject of court proceedings under section 444 Education Act 1996.

As a parent/carer, you can demonstrate your commitment to your child's education by not allowing your child to miss school for anything other than an exceptional and unavoidable reason.

THE FACTS	THE LAW
Yateley School's students are expected to attend punctually on the 190 days that the school is open. Whilst there are a number of unavoidable reasons why a pupil might be away from school (illness, medical appointments, exclusions etc.), the legislation is clear that any avoidable absences may only be authorised by a school if there are exceptional circumstances. WHAT YOU SHOULD CONSIDER	The law allows schools to consider individual requests to authorise a future avoidable absence. However before the school can authorise any such requests, they must satisfy themselves that there are exceptional circumstances which justify such a decision. It is entirely the responsibility of the parent submitting the request to provide sufficient information/evidence in order to establish this fact. The request for leave must come from a parent with whom the child normally resides.
Research suggests that children who are taken out of school may never catch up on the learning they have missed. This may affect test results and can be particularly harmful if the child is studying for final year examinations.	If a child then stays away from school for more than the authorised periods this must be recorded as unauthorised absence and could be quoted in a prosecution for poor attendance.
Children who struggle with English or Mathematics may also find it even harder to cope when they return to school, while younger children may find it difficult to renew friendships with their classmates	If the child is away from school for a total of four weeks or more, the school may have the option to take the child off roll subject to the Education (Pupil Registration) (England) Regulations 2006.
If the school is unable to authorise the absence and the child is still taken out of school, this will be recorded as unauthorised absence and you may receive a fine per parent for each child.	In the case of unexpected extended absence, it is advisable that the parent fully informs the school as to the reasons. If a child is removed from roll, there is no guarantee that the child will regain a place at the school.































