#### **Dear Parents**






#### **STEM Icons**

#### STEM icon – Leonardo da Vinci



A 15<sup>th</sup> Century super star Leonardo da Vinci was a Painter, Scientist, Philosopher, Inventor, designer, Architect, Engineer, Musician and much much more. The Ultimate Renaissance Man and polymath, a genius, a man before his time, my hero!

It was written of him 'he was like a man who woke up too early, in the darkness while everyone was still sleeping'. If I were to ever be given the opportunity to work with someone from the past it would be with Leonardo da Vinci.

Did you know that, in addition to his most famous works, the Mona Lisa, the Last Supper and the Vitruvian Man, Da Vinci had a really impressive list of inventions to his name (admittedly some of them didn't work)?

For example:

A Flying Machine/glider, a helicopter, the ball bearing, a self-propelled cart, the parachute, a machine gun, an Armoured 'Car', a type of harpsichord, the flip-flop! Diving suite, a Portable Bridge, the mitre Lock on canals (still in use today), a variable transmission system, and even a Robot! He also managed to work out why the sky was blue! He was such a creative and inventive mind, he never stopped coming up with new ideas.

Leonardo was primary know as architect and a painter in his lifetime, he was also left handed, largely self-taught, a vegetarian and gay. My fascination grew from his work as an inventor and engineer and when I came across a book of his graphics work; his sketches and designs, I was hooked.
