## ENGLISH

The aim of Key Stage 3 English is to help students become skilful communicators in both written and spoken communication. Students will do this by reading and analysing all forms of fiction and non-fiction texts; explore the power of language and experiment with their own expressions of communication. At the heart of English we want to foster a passion for stories - whether they are real or imagined; theirs or another's. It is the ability to understand another person's story whilst being able to tell your own that helps a person to understand themselves and the world around us.

What skills will I develop?

You are already an astute student of English and can adapt your use and understanding of English in a variety of contexts but through the three years of KS3, we will embed, develop and refine these key skills of communication. Through the texts that you study and the writing that you produce you will understand that language has layers and it is by exploring these layers that you extend your skills of analysis and critical thinking.

- Building on the foundation blocks of writing, you will extend your creative writing skills in a variety of formats, to shape and craft your language and structural choices to speak to your audiences and achieve your purpose.

Through discussions, presentations and role play you will become confident at justifying and expressing your opinion.

What great resources can I use?

- Get lost in the library! Each unit of study has an attached extended reading list and there's no better way of understanding an author, genre or theme than by exploring other works that link to it.

- Read the news it is from the real stories and events around us that new stories are imagined and created.

How will I be assessed?

English assessments are divided in to the three core strands of Reading, Writing and Speaking and Listening. Within each strand there are key age related expectations that make up a specific level of achievement from Level 1 to 6, with an exceptional performance level of 7 also available.

These expectations have been guided and influenced by the KS4 criteria but are separate from and designed to the requirements of KS3. Therefore, the data and judgements received from KS2 assessments correlates to a student's target level in Years 7, 8 and 9 and that by the end of each year the majority of students will be achieving the following:

Year 7 = level 2 - 3 Year 8 = level 3 - 4 Year 9 = level 4 - 5

Three ways that parents/carers can help...

- 1. Visit Yateley Library or charity/book shops to find reading material that both you and your child enjoy and can share the pleasure of reading.
- 2. Show awareness that language has power engage in conversations with your child to discuss how the intent of certain vocabulary choices and imagery can impact its audience.
