


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Learning Together – Empowered for Life

Dear Parent / carer,

Alongside Mr Keeble, I have delivered an assembly style video message to all of the students. Rather like a good bit of marked work, there was a huge, long list of 'what went wells'; in other words, the multitude of things that as a school community we've done brilliantly, especially over this term. Adapting to and accepting the COVID restrictions, working hard and effectively in class and demonstrably behaving well are perhaps the most notable elements. Equally noticeable though has been the resilience, teamwork and often compassion which defines our team. It works well because we work well together and we're hugely proud of what our students and school community have achieved. However, sticking with the marked work analogy, alongside the 'what went wells' are the 'even better ifs' - fortunately a much shorter list. This includes universal respect of the school site and facilities and making sure that standards of uniform don't drop. One further element with which some parents may need to assist is punctuality in the morning. The vast majority of students arrive bang on time, meaning that we can send them straight off to class in an orderly fashion and preserve the integrity of the 'bubbles'. A tiny minority view the arrival times as a guide rather than a rule and this needs to stop! Students arriving even a few minutes late will immediately become detached from the rest of their class or year group and safety can be compromised. From next week onwards we'll be bringing harsher sanctions to bear on any who routinely flaunt this important safety rule. With only three weeks to go before the Christmas holidays, the importance cannot be overstated of maintaining our guard and not letting complacency creep in. Whatever the outcome locally and nationally with the changing regulations over Christmas, in the meantime I would like us to do our bit as a school community in keeping everyone safe.

Parent Governor Election. You will be aware from our earlier communications that there is an election running at the moment for two positions as parent governor. The job of Governor in this school is immensely important. Well done to everyone who took part. The shortlisted poems will be displayed on the library notice board near school reception. Cery's winning poem is below:




