Learning Together – Empowered for Life

Dear parents and carers

A Monday like no other...

With a keen eye for detail and a chance to slope off work, it was Mr Hill who alerted me that England were due to open their World Cup campaign on Monday 21 November. Having canvassed many of our students it became very clear that some of them had "brewing tummy issues" or "growing headaches" that were on a flight path to being very ill — entirely coincidentally — on Monday 21 November (circa 1pm). This would have meant missing lessons all morning and as a school we wanted to turn this to our advantage by allowing students to watch the match (with parental consent). After offering an initial 200 tickets to parents we managed to sell all of those after just 48 minutes and, as the reserve list grew and grew (to over 400!) we realised we'd have to use the Sports Hall as well. Mr Hill expertly organised the ticketing, attendance and screenings at both venues and



once underway the atmosphere at both events was fantastic. The behaviour of our students was excellent and the overall school attendance on Monday was 96.1% which was lovely to see. Thanks to everyone involved in our Monday like no other!

Safe Drive, Stay Alive A worrying statistic across Thames Valley and Hampshire last year was that an average of 4 young people per week were killed or seriously injured in a road traffic accident. Young drivers are much more likely to be



involved in a crash on the roads, often due to inexperience and a lack of knowledge of the risks. Around 1 in 4 deaths on the road is aged 17-24. With this in mind, taking the whole sixth form to Safe Drive Stay Alive is one of the most important things that we do. Students watched a hugely powerful mixture of film and personal testimony from both people involved in road safety and victims of accidents. They ranged from police, ambulance and fire & rescue personnel, to an A&E consultant and with video from a young driver serving 8 years in prison for causing death by dangerous driving. However, the person most of our students came away thinking about was a mother whose daughter was killed, aged 19, in a car crash. She described in almost unbearable detail the events of that terrible day and how her and that of her family's lives were changed forever. There wasn't a dry eye in the house: both her intense grief and immense courage were plain to see. She was followed by a woman who had received a severe traumatic brain injury in a crash and has been left needing almost full-time care.

The event really does a great job of showing the wide effect of road traffic accidents. By taking our entire sixth form I hope that we can have a real impact in helping them, as a group to think more about their safety on the roads, both as drivers and passengers. First Aid in PSHE. In PSHE this week, Year 9 students have been learning about basic first aid with the help of Mrs Allen, our

School Nurse.



Activities included learning how to perform CPR, EpiPen training, how to stop a bleed, the recovery position, how to put on a sling and what goes in a First Aid Kit. All Year 9 students will have this opportunity over the coming weeks.

This initiative was driven by our students; when asked at the start of the year what life skills they would like to learn, they specified that EpiPen training was something they would like to have. Many of our

students have friends who carry an EpiPen and they wanted to know how to administer them in case of emergency, especially if there were no adults around.

Sixty students performing CPR for a full three minutes to the sounds of the Bee Gees 'Staying Alive' is a memory that will stay with us for a very long time!

The 'best sling' award goes to Josh Spilsbury 9WS and Kaden Allsopp 9DS (pictured).

Student Star of the week is Ella Defazio in 7PN. Having only been racing for less than a year, Ella



is now 2nd in the UK in her class of Karting. In a sport that is not well represented amongst girls, Ella has shown the boys a thing or two and comprehensively stormed through the ranks and taken her TonyKart to UK number 2 in a competition held in London last weekend, beating the reigning champion of three years' standing along the way!

Something which had started as a fun activity at a birthday party, has developed into a passion and she now has her sights set on the intermediate class – with the same chassis and a faster engine (she's already reaching speeds of around 55mph!). Racing driver Jessica Hawkins has talent spotted her and



has undertaken to train and mentor Ella as a budding talent. Congratulations!

Uniform and Mobile Phones

Following the school comms that was sent out this week, we are sorry to have to send out this message to everyone again, but we wanted to ensure consistency with all students in the school around our uniform policy and expectations. Firstly, a huge thank you to all of you that support the school to ensure that your child attends school meeting the uniform expectations.

It is a small proportion of students that are currently starting to push some of the boundaries about what is and is not allowed. We have requested this morning for all staff to be extra supportive and consistent in addressing any issues where students might not be meeting expectations. This could result in warnings, confiscations or even sanctions where needed, and we would appreciate your support with this.

Some of the main areas we have seen a small increase in concern are:

- 1. Eye lash extensions these are not allowed and there should not be excessive eye lash makeup
- 2. Piercings nose piercings are not allowed and students are only allowed a one plain stud in each ear
- 3. Rings and bracelets these are not allowed, students are allowed a wrist watch
- 4. Mobile phones these should be turned off and away during the school day and while on school site (unless a teacher allows use in a lesson)
- 5. Ear pods and earphones these are not allowed (unless teacher allows use in a lesson)
- 6. Uniform students should be wearing the school uniform
- 7. Coats and outer wear students should be wearing a suitable winter coat if needed and not a hoody, non-school jumper or body warmer
- 8. Fizzy and caffeinated drinks and chewing gum all are not allowed in school

STEM Master Class Formula One Strategy

It appears that our students were a little conservative as the only team to put on the fastest wearing tyres won. Hopefully these students will be inspired to programme their own models to play with.


