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

Learning Together – Empowered for Life

Dear Parents and carers,

If I were to have known a year ago what the forthcoming year would bring, let alone the last seven weeks, I really would have thought it was April Fools' Day! Yet, in the last term we've administered over 6000 lateral flow tests, run an entire exam series for Years 11 and 13, brought everyone back into the building and learning together again safely. I am hugely impressed and proud of the determination and resilience of the whole school community – staff, students and parents. There's still some way to go, but some very obvious light at the end of the tunnel. People will need these Easter holidays for a variety of reasons, but in all cases – well deserved!



I should point out that there are some lessons coming out of the last year though that we would be unwise to ignore. The harnessing of digital technology is a must in lessons and it is vital that we keep up momentum with the use of BYOD technology in lessons and at home. This is a part of our work which can only grow in importance, so do please keep supporting by making sure that your child keeps their device charged and brings it into school every day. Following overwhelming parent support, we will be retaining the online parents' evening

system into next year. Clearly the lure of having appointments on time from the comfort of home is attractive, so the days of lengthy queues in a draughty school hall are over. That said, if a longer conversation is required with a member of staff, I should stress that this is absolutely a priority and these can be via phone, video call, or face to face meeting. The final point on this that I'd like to make is about the longer lessons. Support has been overwhelming from students and staff for retaining the double lessons into the next academic year – as in the majority of cases it has been so much easier to really explore topics properly, concentrate for extended periods and enjoy more challenging practical work. It is not perfect, but is certainly preferred and it dramatically reduces wasted movement time between lessons around the school site. The longer term plan is to explore even more effective timetable permutations, but that is not for September 2021.

Uniform – update from Mr Keeble and the pastoral team

We are aware that it has sometimes been difficult for parents/carers to source the correct school shoes due to shops being closed, however from 12th April this will no longer be the case. Therefore, as from Monday 19th April we are expecting <u>ALL</u> students to be in the correct school uniform (unless we have written medical professional reasons giving permission otherwise). Students will be checked on a daily basis as they enter school site and also during the school day. This will be either by tutors, Heads of House or members of the senior leadership team. Any student that is not meeting the school's uniform expectations will be issued a school detention on a daily basis from 19th April until the issue is resolved (unless of course there is professional medical reason to support the difference in uniform). Items like Bluetooth earphones, mobile phones being out, incorrect jewellery and hoodies will be confiscated and will require parents to come and collect from main reception. Students should also be equipped for their learning each day (BYOD, books, pencil case with correct items, etc).

As from Tuesday 4th May (following the May Day Bank Holiday) students will be allowed to wear the summer uniform.















We appreciate all parents and carers in supporting us with this. Some brief reminders of the expectations are:

- CLICK HERE Full uniform policy and guidance
- Shoes = Black, polishable, formal, low heel, plain, traditional style (no logos, trainers, boots, canvas or similar styled shoes like Vans and Converse)
- **Jewellery** = No jewellery is allowed except a wristwatch; a single small plain stud in each ear. No other visible piercings, no spacers
- Skirt length = Standard school uniform stitch down box pleated style at least 18 inches in length, no jersey or pencil skirts. The skirt should be knee length and (allowing for growth) never less than 4 inches (10 cm) above the knee.
- Coat = Denim jackets, "hoodies", tracksuit tops, body warmers are not allowed. An outdoor coat with sleeves in a plain, dark colour. No obvious badges or slogans
- Bluetooth earphones and mobile phones = These are not allowed to be used or seen during the school day (unless permission is given by a teacher).

Year 7 to 11 Tutor Time Return - Term 5

It is important we begin to slowly re-introduce tutor time to allow tutors to see their tutees (get to know them as individuals; begin to develop house and tutor group identify, ethos and belonging; addressing concerns with attendance and behaviour; congratulating on the positives, etc).

To begin with, we are only going to re-introduce tutor time on Mondays for Term 5 with a view to having tutor time every day in Term 6. For assemblies, the Heads of House will be issuing a couple of video house assemblies during Term 5 to the students and there no planned year assemblies at the moment. We hope to look to have some form of physical assemblies in Term 6.

Student Leadership – Year 10

Term 5 is normally the time each year that we start the Year 10 student leadership process. This enables Year 10 students to apply for various leadership roles in the school (house captains, prefects, etc). However we have decided this year to postpone this until Term 6. We feel that it would be better to run the process when we will be able to see the year group as a whole and speak to them about the roles and application process in person instead of via e-mails.

Attendance is FANTASTIC!

We wanted to say how brilliant it is that our students have been attending school during these difficult times this year, especially compared to what the national data and figures are showing.

Our school target is to have a student attendance of 96% or higher. From September 3rd 2020 to March 26th 2021 we have an attendance of 94.9%. This might be lower currently than our target by 1.1% but compared to current national figures this is fantastic!

We can still achieve our school target by the end of this academic year by ensuring that all students attend school every day unless of course they have a legitimate reason not to be in (too ill to attend, etc). The only way that students can improve in their progress, studies, life skills and all round well-being is to attend school.
