As we approach the long, bank holiday, we also conclude a busy and highly successful week. Although we are still quite some way from full normality and a lot of our restrictions and protective measures remain in place, it certainly feels like there's a rush of very welcome energy around the school. Year 11 and 13 can see the end in sight and have been absolutely amazing with their attitude and approach and have been extremely motivated and diligent in completing what must sometimes seem like an endless raft of assessments. NTP National Tutoring Program

We have registered with National Tutoring Partner "Smart Teachers" and booked 1:3 online sessions in blocks of 15 hours. The sessions are delivered by fully qualified subject specialist teachers, with in-depth knowledge and experience of the national curriculum. We will provide tutors with all the necessary data for each student (along with the topics to cover) to ensure that they can make a flying start and that the time is well-spent!



We have successfully registered 117 students from year 7 to 10. We are offering these individuals the opportunity to develop their skills and refine their learning by working in a small group of 3, focusing on developing key skills and any gaps in their curriculum knowledge with fully qualified subject specialist teachers. Mrs Jeyakumaran is working closely with the allocated tutor from NTP, Heads of Department and the

students in order to ensure that they are able to improve their progress. This opportunity is a significant is a significant investment of time and resource, but we see immense value in supporting individuals to close any gaps caused as a result of time spent away from school!
