Dear Parents and Carers


Another full week down – and very successfully too. Certainly, when I watch the national situation, I'm delighted for every day of near normality and that bit more learning that is taking place. My staff have commented very positively both about the new routines and expectations and also about the purposeful and mature way in which the vast majority of students have returned to school. Some even privately rather like the new double lessons and may petition to keep them! This is also borne out by the conversations I've had with students who have shown tremendous resilience and determination - they're keen to learn and equally keen to see their friends again. Long may this continue. I routinely tour the school site and have seen fantastic work taking place.

Those who know me, know my relentless optimism, but even I can't fail to notice that as of Wednesday this week, 30 schools nationally have temporarily closed completely due to COVID and well over 300 have partial closures. We cannot afford to take any chances and I want to work with you collectively and very hard to minimise the risk and threat to our school community and this will involve every single person playing their part.

We all know the importance of full attendance. However even more important is trying to keep COVID out of our school. If you, your child, or a member of your household has these symptoms, stay at home, self-isolate and do not return to normal life until you've received a negative (clear) COVID test:

(source BBC) Most people who feel ill with coronavirus will have at least one of the key symptoms:

#### Coronavirus: Key symptoms



- a high temperature
- a new, continuous cough
- a loss or change to their sense of smell or taste

If your family is self-isolating, please let us know and also what the outcome of a COVID test is – although I'm acutely conscious of how difficult these can be to obtain. If you receive a positive test result you must please let us know. If it is your child that tests positive and they have been in school, it is vital

that you inform us as we'll need to act immediately on that information. Almost inevitably that would mean a year group, or a part year group being sent home to self-isolate. Not the news any of us want to give or receive! This bulletin is not intended to be a means of issuing instructions; however, I cannot overstress the importance of every individual following the simple precautionary guidance on hand hygiene, social distancing and of course social gatherings. I am very aware that (especially with older students) unless we - the adults - are vigilant and clear (both in and out of school) we will run at increasing risk.















A further note on COVID testing. You may have heard of schools having self-testing kits. This is misleading, as we only have a handful of these kits. We are not a testing site and these tests are not available to students or families. To avoid disappointment, please do not ask us for them as we'll have to refuse; they are not for public distribution and are intended for use in extreme situations with very vulnerable people.

<u>School Day timings</u>. We're happy that our procedures so far have been robust and straightforward. I have announced to year 7 and 8 parents earlier today that we are finishing the school day 5 minutes earlier <u>for year 7 and 8 only</u> from Monday 21<sup>st</sup> September. There are a couple of other internal timing adjustments too, adding a small amount of extra movement time for morning break.

Do please also note that we are not intending to initiate indoor wet weather procedures at break or lunchtime until we absolutely have to. We will continue with outdoor mustering for obvious safety reasons for as long as we possibly can. There is some light rain in the longer-range weather forecast, so do please make sure that your child has appropriate clothing and wet weather protection. Clearly when the weather necessitates it, we will move to indoor mustering and that revised plan will be published in due course.



A final point on the new operational systems. Thank you for your support in sourcing masks for your child to wear if they have to leave the classroom for the toilet or any other reason. This has happened without a hitch, so I'm grateful for your help with this. Equally, I'm grateful to parents and carers, who in very large part have heeded the request to not drive onto (or near) the school site before or after school. This makes a huge difference, reduces congestion and makes our lives when supervising children at the front of school so much easier. Thank you also for booking face to face appointments if you have to visit the school site and transacting business by phone or email if at all possible.



As you'd imagine, even in these strange times, we are going to be ready for an open evening with a difference! Obviously, the event won't be face-to-face, so we're planning a virtual extravaganza instead. We're

building a web hosted interactive tour, with student and staff introductions to the different subjects, all the informative talks that you'd expect and an opportunity to register for a live Q&A with key staff. The platform will be live by the published date of 1<sup>st</sup> October and we'd encourage all of our community – new, existing and prospective parents to take a look and see just what's on offer at Yateley School.

Exactly the same principle is being used for the Sixth Form Open Evening – calendared for 8<sup>th</sup> October. All of our current Year 11 students and families can expect to see the Yateley Sixth form at its 'outstanding' best; also with interactive subject links and a chance to join live Q&A sessions. Further details will come out on both of these shortly, but do please let our own students know and of course young people and their families in other schools who should be considering joining our fantastic sixth form.

- o 'DO' rather than 'READ' so when you read/watch videos make revision notes and then redo the question.








