Some dates for your diaries. We have published our INSET training days for 2018 -19. They are 3rd and 4th Sept / 29th October, 7th Jan and 14th March. Please note that 14th March 2019 is a Thursday mid-term, so hopefully with sufficient notice, families can accommodate around that. Also, please be aware that our Open Evening for new and prospective students and families is to be held on Thursday 27th September 2018. This has formerly been held in the summer, but we feel it will have more impact a little later and we're really excited about meeting the next generation of Yateley students.

With exam season in full swing we have been blown away by our cohort of Y11s! One of the big initiatives that we've been working on this year is running morning "prep sessions" for our Y11s that run from 0800-0840am for exams they have that day. Having not held prep sessions before we were very much unsure as to how well attended they would be, not least because many students aren't even awake by 0800am let alone dressed, in school and working hard! Day one of the GCSEs arrives and by 0800am we had 126 students in the main hall for ICT which meant (when combined with those attending Computer Science and Latin) that over 150 students were studying with us at 0800am. It was a truly remarkable sight and enormously humbling to see the dedication of the year group.

The volume of students choosing to not hit the snooze button has grown throughout the week with attendance to Drama, RS, PE, French, Chemistry and Biology all having very high turnouts of Y11s chomping at the bit to succeed. They're also chomping on the free bananas that the school is providing with free bottles of water at the same time! Those that follow the school Twitter account @yateleyschool will know just how proud we are and how delighted we've been by their effort; this really is a special Y11 cohort and their work ethic is unquestionable.



In addition to our morning sessions we are running additional lessons in school before exams and after-school study sessions which are just as busy with our students going that extra mile to succeed. These opportunities are published to Y11 students and parents via a weekly bulletin called "GCSE Week Ahead" and the feedback on this has been resoundingly positive. So well done everyone, we are delighted with your effort and engagement and we wish you all continued success with your GCSEs.

With news from our Sixth Form, Mr Mather our director of Sixth Form writes, 'Exam season is go! There is a strange kind of relief once the AS and A Level exams are under way. Students have been looking towards them for a long time and finally we can settle into the different rhythm of revision and exam. Of course a great deal more has been happening in the Sixth Form too. It was lovely to welcome a large number of families to

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our Higher Apprenticeship and UCAS evening last week. This was followed by Yr12 Tutors showing students every university course in existence (quite literally!) on Tuesday and students took the time to explore the incredible range of options that are out there. We will be continuing to support Year 12 in their application materials for both university and other routes next half of term too. Year 13 have also been finalising their pre-exam-future-preparations. Mr Plummer has expertly guided our Extended Project students through their projects and the last few weeks have seen them delivering presentations of topics as varied as *Corruption in Football* (an impassioned plea for more transparency in the beautiful game by Ellis Heaton) through to the *Myth of Touch* (an unbelievable piece of work by our resident Physics savant Janine Lanek). I have been extremely impressed by all of our EPQ students and their excellent work. It has been a great pleasure to watch them deeply dive into a topic for the joy of academic pursuit alone and then witness them breathlessly surface clutching new knowledge and a greater understanding of their own potential. YEAR 11 MATHS UPDATE


