UCAS Higher Education Fair: Surrey University. On Monday, the whole of Year 12 attended the UCAS convention at the University of Surrey, in Guildford. This exhibition is arranged by UCAS and includes over 180 stalls for a wide range of Higher Education establishments, including apprenticeships, with talks and seminars on student finance and selecting the right apprenticeship or course for you.

This has sparked much conversation and the Sixth Form has been buzzing with excited discussions of the students' future plans. This work is being supported

through students' use of UniFrog, which is an online platform which allows them to compare every



opportunity and apply successfully. In our weekly tutorial sessions, the tutors hold one-to-one conversations giving advice and guidance on applications and personal statements for University and Higher-Level Apprenticeships.

What is UCAS? UCAS is a charity that processes applications to study full-time courses at universities and colleges in the UK. Their aim is to help students make informed choices that are right for them by guiding them through the entire higher education application process and beyond. To support this, they provide a wide range of valuable information and services for applicants, their parents, and teachers.

Sixth Form Subject Review Evening Thank you to all parents who attended our Year 12 and 13 subject review evening on Thursday 27 January 2020. There is a great deal of expectation and promise in these two year groups and the evening was positive and well received. There are some timely messages about study habits and exam preparation of course, but in large part, the sixth form are equipping themselves well for success.

Having said that, we've been involved with the national By Leaders For Leaders network for some time now and it was a delight to welcome a number of senior colleagues from schools across a wide geographical area to come and see our excellent work, where we've been identified for our excellent practice. The visitors were here for the morning on Thursday and their feedback was absolutely amazing. As always, the students were singled out for high praise.

Coronavirus As one might expect, there is justifiable concern about the possible spread of the coronavirus and parents will be aware of a very small number of schools who have made precautionary closures, seemingly in the main from having had ski trips return from the affected area in Italy (ours was in Austria). I will keep a very close eye on guidance from Public Health England and from Hampshire Local Authority. There is a wealth of information and speculation in the public domain and from the BBC I have taken the following statement – 'Public Health England's medical director Prof Paul Cosford acknowledged schools had to take "difficult decisions given the complexity of the issues that they're facing". "Of course, schools have difficult decisions to take - a whole range of issues to take into account and we are able to talk to them about their specific circumstances and help them make the right decisions for them," he said. "But what I would say is that our general advice is not to close schools." Speaking in the Commons on Wednesday, Health Secretary Matt Hancock said there was "no blanket closure" for schools and the "goal was to keep schools open".'

Needless to say, we won't take any gambles in our public responsibilities, but neither will we be making unfounded panic reactions. The advice from Public Health England is clear and it is the public responsibility to follow this advice. 
Last week's solution was take the bishop on e3 with the knight, putting the king in check. This unleashes a threatening bishop on the main dark diagonal.
