The challenge included having to come up with the idea, including an electronic release mechanism, a suitable launch system and of course the vehicle itself – all within budget constraints. They also had to present their design in a 'dragons Den' style interview and finally test it scoring points





against set criteria. Although our teams didn't win the overall competition they all gave a great account of themselves and were a credit to our school. Special mention should go to Daniel Morgan whose logo design for his team won the award for the best logo design of all the teams (14 in total) and as a result the school was presented with a limited addition print of one of their aircraft. London Trip 10th June

A group of Sixth Form Criminology, Sociology and Psychology students enjoyed an interesting, if slightly damp, day out in London visiting the Holocaust Exhibition at the Imperial War Museum and the London Dungeon.

The Criminology and Sociology students are embarking on the crime and punishment elements of their courses and Psychology students

will have studied element of behaviour, which link to the Holocaust.

Broadmoor Psychologist visit 13th June

Dr Simon Draycott, who has worked at Broadmoor Hospital in Crowthorne for 16 years, gave an enlightening talk to sixth form Criminology students on his role and career.

Dr Draycott is a psychologist who specialises in personality disorders and treating patients who exhibit violent behaviour. He discussed how he became interested in this career path and the daily challenges of working in Broadmoor, which is a highly secure hospital for seriously ill patients. His talk brought to life many of the components Criminology students study in their Level 3 Diploma. The level of questioning, from this group of Year 12 students illustrated their enthusiasm for the subject and Dr Draycott said: "I could see they were totally engaged. It was a really energising experience for me."

The Level 3 Criminology Diploma requires that students apply the material covered in the course and this includes using what they have learned to explore elements of criminality, such as the 'criminal mind'. The talk was also attended by some A level Psychology students and Head of Psychology, Mrs Norrish.
















STEM DAY




even flames to see which material is the most durable. Our students have also discussed how to stay safe when using the Bunsen burners and chemicals.


